More than 80 million people took in at least one film per week at the height of the cinema's popularity. This period also saw the introduction of the Production Code, B-Films, and the first animated feature of Snow White. Hollywood's Golden Age began to decline in the USA during the late 1940's due to the introduction of television, Hollywood blacklisting, and the ability of actors to become 'free agents.' The venue for each course will be one of the following, as shown on the respective course listing:

- **Citiplace** refers to the upstairs Conference Room at Citiplace Community Centre, on the Eastern Concourse, above Perth Railway Station.
- **Lecture Theatre 1** North Metropolitan TAFE. The main entrance to Building 2 is from Aberdeen St opposite a pedestrian crossing and close to Blue Cat stop 9 (Central Institute). The Aroma Café is just to the right. Enter the glass doors into the foyer. Lecture Theatre 1 (room may change) is to the left under a large flight of stairs and opposite the doors to the College Library.
- **Kimberley Room G3** is on the ground floor of the State Library Building, just near the Café.
- **North West Room 2.9** is in the State Library, second floor in the north-west corner of the building. From the lift straight ahead to the left of the stairway some 10 metres, then left along a wide aisle, leading to the door of the room.
- **Mid-West Room** is on the Mezzanine floor of the State Library Building behind the play area.
