SEMINAR—US AUSTRALIAN RELATIONS

On 25 May, members were treated to a wide perspective of the geopolitical relationships that tie the United States to Australia in our region. The address was presented by Professor Stephen Smith, Winthrop Professor of Law, UWA and former Minister for Foreign Affairs, Minister for Trade and Minister for Defence in the previous Federal Labor Government.

Professor Smith focussed his presentation in the context of Australia's position and history in the SE Asia/Pacific region. Because we have no land border with another nation, we have always demonstrated an outward focus in our relations with other nations. We have always maintained bilateral relations with the UK and the USA, and we have always been early to recognise and act on developments and shifts in power among the ASEAN nations.

Despite our small population, Australia has a large economy, variously ranking 13th, 14th, and 15th within the G20 nations and exerts a degree of influence well above our relative size.

Since the second world war, Australian has maintained a strong alliance with the US; however, that has not impeded us from cementing strong economic ties with other nations, especially with China. We are our own nation which maintains our own sovereignty and geopolitical independence.

With the decline (for us) in European economic influence over the last decade or two, both Australia and the US have strengthened their ties with the nations of the Pacific region. This is seen as a balancing of the influence of an emerging China within the region, but also a shift in the centre of gravity of the world economy to the Pacific region.

Much criticism has been levelled at both sides of politics in Australia about allowing investment by foreign nations (particularly China) in Australia. Stephen Smith countered this criticism with the reverse perspective. Over recent years Australian companies have vastly increased investment in Pacific Rim nations that far outweigh foreign investment in Australia; and, despite these new levels of influence, investment in Australia by the UK still far outweighs all other foreign investment.

Stephen forecast that the next nations in which Australian investment may occur will be Vietnam, Indonesia and India. One point he emphasised was that wherever Australia figures prominently in investment, that investment outweighs direct trade with those nations. This is particularly so for the US.

Stephen forecast a further shift in influence in the coming decades. Australia will become the fulcrum point for a shift in the centre of economic gravity to the Indo/African region. By 2050, China, India, Indonesia and Africa will become the powerhouses of the world. Western Australia will become pivotal in exerting Australia's influence in this region. Already, the African Union may invest up to \$22billion in WA and this could well be reciprocated. Military alliances may also be cemented in the development of an Indian Ocean Alliance consisting of India, Indonesia, Africa and Australia.

Where does all this leave our future relationship with the US? The Australian/US Alliance is independent of who the President of the US or the Prime Minister of Australia are. So Stephen sees no particular concern for the recent establishment of Donald Trump as President. Many of the key people in the new administration are already well known to Australia and they know Australia well. Hence, the robust inter-relationship we already enjoy with the US will continue.

Is Australia the lapdog of the US? No. Australia acts as its own sovereign nation, and will no doubt exert its own independence in future relations, with or without Donald Trump. Nonetheless, Donald Trump's Presidency will almost certainly involve some surprises with respect to his style of administration. His relationships with North Korea and China have already demonstrated hawkish behaviour.

One thing seems certain for us and other nations in the region — business as usual, but, expect the unexpected!

Known as the Wanneroo Wednesday Walkers (WWW), the group was formed earlier this year by two active members, Constance O'Brien and Cheryl Cundall. Together, Constance and Cheryl plan each week's walking route and provide an annotated map at the meeting place on the day. Variety is the key and the walks can be long or short depending on the ability and inclination of the walkers.

Sharing a love of the outdoors, and appreciative of Wanneroo's unique parks and trails, the pair were disappointed to find that litter was often spoiling the natural environment.

"There are some really lovely places in Wanneroo and Joondalup, but they are often spoiled by all sorts of rubbish," Constance said. "We simply couldn't enjoy our walks and ignore the problem."

WESTERN SUBURBS BRAIN GAME

For eight successive Thursdays beginning in May, a group of U3A (UWA) Western Suburbs Region members have been



meeting to extend the usefulness of their grey matter by playing a series of "Brain Games" The idea of "Brain Games" came from a U3A group in NSW who prepared a booklet giving ideas of how to exercise the brain which research has shown plays an important part in warding off dementia and Alzheimer's' Disease.

One member offered to be the initial facilitator but after about three weeks two other members had volunteered to organize the 2-hour meeting for the next week or two. To date, "Brain Games" sessions have mainly taken the form of word and number puzzles of various descriptions including sudoku, simple crosswords and also cryptic crosswords. Trivia questions will also be featured. One member of the group initially greeted the news of learning to do cryptic


crosswords with something like horror saying that she had been married to a cryptic crossword expert for thirty-five years but had never had the slightest inclination to learn to solve them herself. However, after not very long, and with experts at hand to explain the various types of clues, she began to see that cryptic crosswords could be quite fun and also a challenge. Two of the group have been doing crosswords and other puzzles for years and soon proved to be very talented in solving these quickly but were also able to give gentle hints to others who were struggling in unfamiliar territory. The sessions are NOT competitive – we only strive to better our own results.

It is believed that U3A (UWA) Western Suburbs Region is the first region to set up a "Brain Games" course in W.A. There was some surprise that more participants did not initially enrol to join but it is hoped that with a little more publicity, others will see the benefit and, hopefully, another eight-week course can be organized. To be quite honest, fully half the fun of the afternoon is the social aspect of all trying together and laughing at our own ignorance.


